NOT APRIL FOOLS

The day after Easter Sunday is April Fool's Day, one day I just could never really relate to. Still, as a youngster, I probably participated in it more than I care to admit. For a child it can be a day of tomfoolery, playful pranking and fun for jokesters. However, as adults we come to realize it is a day that is predicated on deception, telling lies or half-truths where everything is made alright by adding "April Fool's." In Luke 5, when the Pharisees and scribes begin murmuring against Jesus for dining with Levi the Tax Collector, Jesus answered them, "Those who are healthy have no need for a physician, but those who are sick do." (Luke 5.31 NHEB) Jesus has come for all who are, sick, broken, carrying heavy burdens, guilt, regret, and the list goes on.

Jesus came into the brokenness of our lives and our world to bring hope. In reaching out to Levi, the Lepers, the women, the centurion, the Greeks and Romans, the Sadducees and Pharisees, the children of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and all the children of God, Jesus brings hope. He dies on the cross paying the price for our sin. On Easter Sunday, God raises Jesus from the dead so that we will know life, have our hope renewed, and find strength to live in God's will each day. Our hope comes from both days: Good Friday and the cross, Easter Sunday and the empty tomb.

Matthew West's song, "Truth Be Told" speaks about the truth of Jesus' teaching and helps us understand the significance of what Jesus says in Luke 5.31. There is a verse which says...

There's a sign on the door It says, "Come as you are," but I doubt it 'Cause if we lived like that was true Every Sunday morning pew would be crowded, yeah

But didn't you say church should look more like a hospital

A safe place for the sick, the sinner, and the scarred, and the prodigals Like me

As people of God, we are gathered together, not because we are worthy, holy or already perfect. The closing hymn of The Billy Graham crusade was, for as long as I can remember, "Just as I am". Two of the verses that ring in my heart are... Just as I am, without one plea But that Thy blood was shed for me And that Thou bid'st me come to Thee Oh, Lamb of God, I come, I come

Just as I am, Thou wilt receive Wilt welcome, pardon, cleanse, relieve Because Thy promise I believe Oh, Lamb of God, I come, I come

We are gathered together by God because we are loved, forgiven, cleansed, relieved, broken hearts and lives made whole by the grace and love of God. This is the power of the cross. This is the power of the empty tomb. This is the source of our hope, not that we are perfect, but that God loves us.

The plaque on the Statue of Liberty reads: "give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, the wretched refuse of your teeming shore. send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door!" When the Statue of Liberty was erected and that plaque placed, it was a symbol that was a beacon of light, and hope for the nations of our world. Assurance that here on these shores, people who were battered, abused, homeless, hopeless, could find something different, could find new life.

Our track record as a nation is spotty at best when it comes to living up to that ideal. However, it remains before us as reminder, not of where we have been, but what we aspire to be. I think Maya Angelou puts this into true perspective when she says, "I did then what I knew how to do. Now that I know better, I do better." We continue to move forward, not perfect, not perfected, but aspiring to do better for our generation, our children and grandchildren, and all who will come after us.

As people of God and people of Faith, the Cross and the Empty Tomb stand before us as inspiration and hope for our aspirations. May we live, love and care for one another so that hope is renewed.

God's blessing as we enter the Easter Season! No foolin', +Pastor Brían
